Bird of the month is Wilson's Warbler. Wilson's warblers are small, chirpy, and very spry songbirds. Most of their time is spent flitting in the shrubby understory of the forest hunting for insects. Wilson's warblers are found throughout the U.S., especially in the west. Both male and female are shades of yellow. The males have little black "Caps" that look like mini berate on top of their head. These birds nest on the ground, in bushes, or in small trees, laying about five eggs annually.

Get Things Rolling? On Monday, April 22, Americans will enjoy an annual Easter Tradition by rolling Easter egg on the South Lawn of the White House. Easter egg roll is the oldest annual event. While informal egg-rolling parties may have been held at the White House as far back as Abraham Lincoln's administration, it was Dolley Madison who just suggested a public egg roll, this was not at the White House but at the U.S Capital in 1872. Landscaping concerns led congress to ban the practice in 1878, but legend has it that angry citizens stormed the White House gates and demanded that children be allowed to roll their eggs. President Rutherford B. Hayes had little choice but to open the South Lawn of the White House, and the event has taken place there ever since.

How many of you heard of wet Monday?

The Irish have St. Patrick's Day. Mexicans have Cinco de Mayo. Even the Italians have Columbus Day. For those of Polish descent, there is Dyngus Day, always celebrated the Monday after Easter. Dyngus day is a celebration tied to the end

The ritual splashing of water began with the Baptism of Prince Mieszko I on Easter Monday in the year 966 AD. The Baptism of the prince signified the acceptance of Catholicism as the national religion of Poland.
